

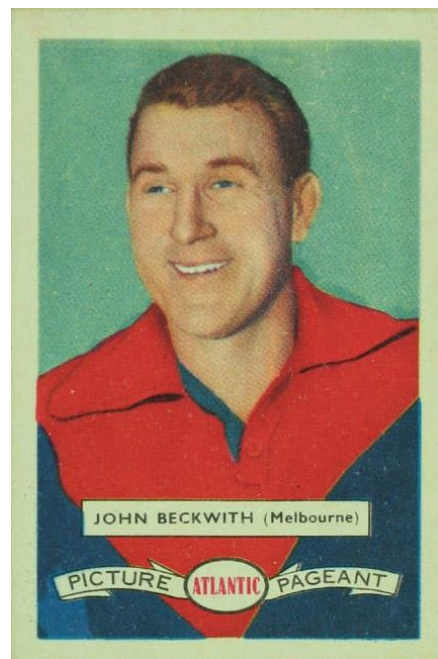

KING'S BIRTHDAY AFL 2024 ROUND 13 COLLINGWOOD V MELBOURNE

VALE JOHN BECKWITH 1932-2024

The football world was saddened to learn of the death of John Beckwith on May 29, aged 91. Described as a “tower of strength” throughout his playing career, Beckwith was renowned for a number of special qualities; for being able to find the boundary line when under attack, for being cool and disciplined under pressure, and for being one of the club’s greatest leaders. Recruited from Black Rock in 1951 as a “brilliant junior footballer”, Beckwith made his senior debut in 1951, going on to play 176 games, including in that number five premierships for Melbourne. While the team lost to Footscray in the 1954 grand final, they rebounded to win the 1955 premiership in fine style against Collingwood, and Beckwith was acknowledged as the Demons’ most consistent player that season. In 1956, he continued to excel as part of the famed Olympic Premiership side that thrashed Collingwood by 73 points. Taking on the captaincy of the club in 1957 aged only 24, he and his deputy, Ron Barassi, formed the youngest leadership combination in the VFL at the time. In his first season in charge he inspired Melbourne to a premiership victory over Essendon by a remarkable 61 points, and was honoured with the best and fairest award. Injury and the 1958 grand final loss to Collingwood were low points in the seasons that followed. The team came back strongly in 1959 to win the club’s 10th premiership. Barassi took on the captaincy in 1960 with Beckwith his deputy. That year he added a fifth premiership to his personal tally and was made a life member of Melbourne. This grand final was his last game with the Demons but Beckwith continued to be an integral part of the club, and coached Melbourne from 1968 to 1970. A member of Melbourne’s Team of the Century, he was also one of the initial inductees in the club’s Hall of Fame in 2001, and was named as a “Hero” for the club’s 150th in 2008.



THE 1951 KING'S BIRTHDAY MATCHES

In 1951 the three King's Birthday holiday matches were played on 11 June. North Melbourne played Fitzroy at the Brunswick Street Oval, North won by 33 points. The Shinboners were led by coach Wally Carter and captain Les Foote and Fitzroy were coached by Norm Smith and captained by Alan Ruthven. North 12.12 (84) defeated Fitzroy 6.15 (51). Richmond played Melbourne at the MCG with an attendance of 51,061. (In the corresponding match in 1950, a King's Birthday match record attendance of 55,002 saw the Demons comprehensively defeat the Magpies). The Demons were coached by Allan La Fontaine and captained by Denis Cordner. The Tigers were coached by Jack Dyer and captained by Bill Morris. Richmond won by 14 points – Richmond 12.9 (81) to Melbourne 9.13 (67). South Melbourne played Footscray at the Lake Oval and won by 47 points – South 17.14 (116) defeated Footscray 9.15 (69) and a crowd of 17,000 attended the match. The Swans were captained/coached by Gordon “Whopper” Lane and Charlie Sutton was Footscray’s captain/coach.

THE KING'S/QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HOLIDAY CLASH

The highest home and away crowd occurred in the 1958 Melbourne and Collingwood Queen's Birthday fixture, when 99,256 attended the Round 10 match. The popularity of the Queen's or King's Birthday matches is astounding. In the early 1890s, crowds turned out in great numbers. One of the great Queen's Birthday rivalries was Essendon and South Melbourne and their meetings at the East Melbourne Cricket Ground attracted 37,108 on Saturday, May 24, 1890, 37,202 on Monday, May 25, 1891 and 35,409 on Tuesday May 24, 1892. In the years of Queen Victoria's reign, the Queen's Birthday holiday was celebrated on May 24 – the date of her birth in 1819 – whichever day of the week it fell on, except when it fell on a Sunday, when Monday May 25 became the holiday. The first VFL season, in 1897, contained one split round: Round 3, with two matches on Saturday, May 22 and two on Monday, May 24. Full rounds were played on Tuesday, May 24, 1898, Wednesday, May 24, 1899, and Thursday, May 24, 1900, with the exception of the Essendon v Collingwood match, which was brought forward to Wednesday, May 23, 1900, an additional public holiday spontaneously proclaimed to celebrate the "Relief of Mafeking" in the Boer War. When Queen Victoria died early in 1901, and Edward VII ascended the throne, the practice began of gazetting this holiday (known as the King's Birthday from 1901 to 1951) on a Monday early in June, while May 24, though no longer a public holiday, was retained as Empire Day.

ABOUT THE KING'S/QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HOLIDAY IN AUSTRALIA

The day has been celebrated since 1788 when Governor Arthur Phillip declared a holiday to mark the sovereign's birthday. Until 1936, it was held on the actual birthday of the monarch, but, after King George V died, it was decided to keep the date on the second Monday in June. This has more evenly spaced out public holidays throughout the year. While George V's successor, Edward VIII, also celebrated his birthday in June, the three sovereigns since have not: George VI's birthday was in December, very close to public holidays for Christmas, Boxing Day and New Year's Day, while Queen Elizabeth II's birthday falls shortly after holidays for Good Friday and Easter and very close to ANZAC Day. Charles III was born on November 14, 1948, three days after Remembrance Day.

THIS ROUND IN HISTORY – ROUND 13 ON THE MCG

The highest Round 13 score at the MCG is 29.18 (192) by Geelong against North Melbourne 17.13 (115) in 1992. The overall Round 13 record is 34.16 (220) by Fitzroy against North Melbourne 10.10 (70) at the Junction Oval in 1983. The highest score in a quarter at the MCG is 10.1 (61) by Geelong during the last quarter against Richmond in 1972. The overall Round 13 record for the highest score in a quarter is 13.2 (80) by South Melbourne against Carlton in the third quarter at the Lakeside Oval in 1934. The most goals kicked by an individual at the MCG in this Round is 11 by Doug Wade for Geelong against Richmond in 1972. The overall Round 13 record is 16 goals by Gordon Coventry for Collingwood against Hawthorn at Victoria Park in 1929. The highest Round 13 attendance at the MCG is 83,407 in 2009 when Essendon defeated Carlton.

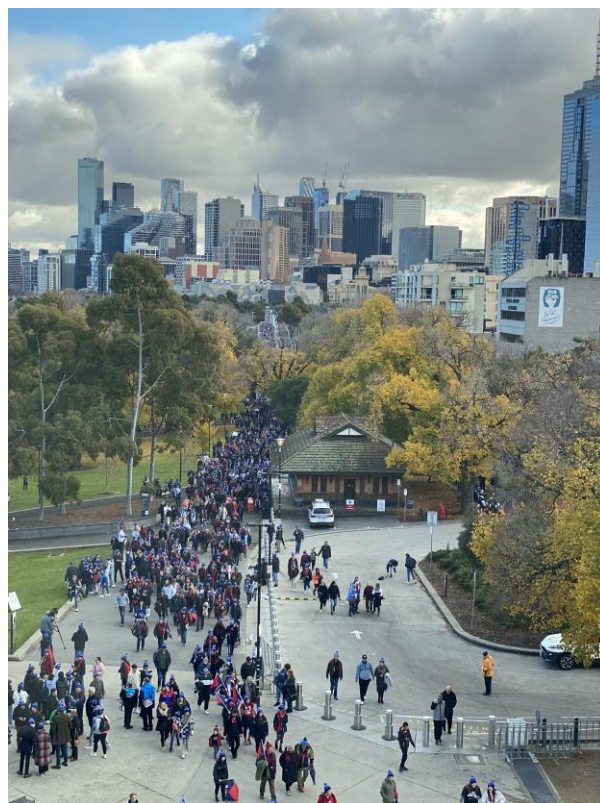

BIG FREEZE AT THE 'G

The annual Big Freeze at the 'G was first held in 2015 as a Motor Neurone Disease (MND) fundraiser. "Big Freeze at the 'G"-branded merchandise is sold, and celebrities and football personalities in fancy dress take a waterslide into a pool of ice-water, situated in the Ponsford Stand, to raise money and awareness. Since 2015 the best player in the Queen's Birthday match has been awarded the Neale Daniher Trophy, named after the Essendon great and former Melbourne coach, whose inspiring battle with MND has galvanised the football community. In 2020, due to the pandemic and Melbourne being in lockdown, the MND Fundraiser, branded Big Freeze 6, was broadcast by Channel 7 from numerous venues on the Queen's Birthday holiday. Although the 2021 Queen's/King's Birthday match was shifted to Sydney, Big Freeze 7, went ahead as scheduled at the MCG.
